Italian painter's interior landscape comes through on canvas

Colors of Tuscany

It doesn't matter whether the subject is food, art, travel, photography, literature or home design. Tuscany seems to be everywhere. Isn't overkill an issue?

It's not, says Domenico Monteforte, a Tuscan painter whose favorite subject is the land he's known since birth.

"It's true that many artists depict Tuscany," said Monteforte, whose "Toscana" exhibition is at the Italian Cultural Institute in San Francisco through Aug. 30. "But each picture is a filter between reality and how one interprets it. When you paint, you bring out your interior."

The 34 oil paintings in the show — some painted on partly visible opera scores — are luminous, vibrant and full of passion and movement. They include trees, hills and flowers, as well as farmhouses and the sea, but never humans.

"Man seems almost like an intrusion," the 45-year-old Monteforte said in Italian.

He doesn't speak English but did just fine during a 10-day visit to San Francisco to install his pictures and attend the June 10 opening. It helped that Monteforte and his girlfriend were staying with Nicola Luisotti, music director of the San Francisco Opera, and his wife in their Pacific Heights home.

Monteforte and Luisotti met in 2007. When the painter appeared on a TV show in Italy,

the interviewer found him strikingly similar to Luisotti, who was conducting "Tosca" in Paris then. Monteforte was heading there two days later, so a meeting was arranged. They felt an immediate
